

Before joining a Zoom meeting, make sure you are running the latest version of Zoom. You can download the latest version here. If you already have the Zoom desktop client installed, you can check for updates by clicking on your profile and then selecting **Check for Updates**.

Join a Meeting


If you have a Zoom account with a profile picture, be sure to log into your Zoom account before clicking the meeting link. Logging in first will ensure that your profile picture is visible. If you do not already have a Zoom account, continue to the next paragraph.

Join a meeting by clicking on a Zoom link provided by the meeting host => follow the prompts

to download and run Zoom, if needed, => enter the meeting ID if prompted => click to join the audio conference. When you're in the meeting, you may click on the Start Video button to start your video.


Mute/Unmute & Audio Settings

You can mute and unmute your microphone. The host also has the ability to mute you. If you click on the arrow next to the mute button, you will have additional options for audio settings. You can change your microphone, leave the computer audio or access the audio options.



Start/Stop Video & Video Settings

You can turn your camera on or off with the Start/Stop Video button. By clicking on the arrow next to the start/stop video button, you can change webcams, access your Zoom video settings, or select a virtual background (if enabled).





Participants

If you click on Participants, you can see who is currently in the meeting. The participants list also gives you the option to rename yourself.

- **Rename** hover over your name and choose More, then Rename. This will change your name as it is seen in the participants list and video window.
- **Pronouns**-you can include your pronouns after your name through the Rename option. E.G. First Last (he/him/his).



Share Screen


If the host allows, you can share your screen in the meeting. The host will have the ability to stop your screen share.



Chat


Chat with individuals or everyone in the meeting. Click **Chat** to open up the chat window and chat with other participants or view chat messages. Select the drop down next to **To:** to change

who you are chatting with. For questions during the Q&A section of sessions, chat **To: Everyone**.






You can react to the speaker with certain emojis and icons by clicking on Reactions. Under Reactions is the Raise Hand button.




Breakout Rooms

In the <u>MWCBS Coffee Break Zoom room</u>, you can gather at any time during the conference. This room is set up with self-select breakout rooms. A breakout room is a space where you can go to have a private conversation with other conference attendees. Alternatively, you can stay in the main room to have your conversation.

To join a breakout room, click the Breakout Rooms icon. Then click Join next to the Room. You will automatically go into the room. To leave the breakout room, click Leave Room in the lower right corner. You will have the option to Leave Breakout Room or Leave Meeting. Select Leave Breakout Room if you want to return to the main room. Select Leave Meeting if you want to leave the Coffee Break area completely.








Choose video layout

At the upper right of the Zoom window, you can switch between active speaker view and gallery view. You can also switch between a shared screen and the video by clicking on a button available in this location during a screen share.



Enter/Exit Full Screen

At the top right of the Zoom window, you can enter or exit full screen mode. You can also exit full screen by clicking **Esc**.




Pin video

Pin video makes a user the primary speaker for you, instead of switching between the active speaker video. You can pin a video by right-clicking on the video of the person you want to pin or double click on their video window.

Co-annotate on screen share

If the host allows, you can annotate on their shared screen or share whiteboard. To do this, click on **View Options** at the top of your screen and choose **Annotate**.





Leave Meeting

You can leave the meeting at any time by clicking on the **Leave Meeting** option at the lowerright corner of the Zoom window.
