### **Welcome to Bowling Green!**

Bowling Green and its affiliated campuses are situated in the homelands of numerous Indigenous and Native tribal lands including the Wyandot, Kickapoo, Miami, Odawa, Powatomi, and others. We sit in the middle of the former Great Black Swamp and all around us are the remnants of interconnected, and often clashing, histories of Indigenous groups, Americans, French, and the British. Today we are a small college town with a vibrant campus and we hope you enjoy your time here.

### **Getting Around:**

The best way to get to Bowling Green by plane is to fly into Detroit/Wayne County Airport (DTW) and either rent a car and drive or take a prearranged shuttle to Bowling Green. But once you arrive it is possible to explore our small city on foot.

Wooster and Main Street cut through town and visitors can find many places to eat, have a drink, and explore, all in a relatively short walk from campus.

If you would like to go a little farther afield from BG, Perrysburg and Toledo are short drives down either I-75 or Ohio State Route 25.

There are limited ride-share options to get around town and to Toledo as well.

### **Restaurants:**

Bowling Green is a traditional college town, with a variety of restaurants close to campus. Below are some highlights, but we hope you'll enjoy a stroll down Wooster to Main street and discover some hidden treasures.

Everyday People Café (\$\$-\$\$\$, 309 S. Main St. Suite D): Breakfast, American. Vegetarian and Vegan options.

Stone's Throw Tavern and Grill (\$\$-\$\$\$, 176 E. Wooster St.): Americanized pub food. Full bar. Evening trivia.

South Side Six (\$, carry out only, 737 S. Main St.): Mediterranean. A local favorite.

Naslada Bistro (\$\$-\$\$\$, 182 S. Main St.): Eastern European. Vegan options.

Porkbelly BBQ (\$\$-\$\$\$, 1616 E. Wooster St.): Barbecue. Relaxed atmosphere.

### Local Breweries and Coffeeshops

- Juniper Brewing Company (\$\$, 145 S. Main St.): American Pub. Small Brewery. Small gastropub menu.
- Brewing Green (\$, 322 N. Grove St. Suite C): Small local brewery. Often has small food trucks and live music outside. A little further away from campus, but a great atmosphere.
- Flatlands Coffee (\$\$-\$\$\$, 138 N. Main Street): Modern coffee shop with fresh baked goods from local establishments. Nice place for a good cup of coffee or to get a little work done before a busy day.

### **Local Attractions:**

Bowling Green and the surrounding areas are full of wonderful natural and artistic attractions. **The Ft. Meigs Historic Site** (29100 W. River Road, Perrysburg, OH), at the site of the War of 1812 battlefield, includes a museum, visitor center, and fully reconstructed fort that will be open at the time of the conference. General admission is \$10; seniors pay \$8; students pay \$5. The **Toledo Museum of Art** (2445 Monroe St, Toledo, OH) includes the museum and Glass Pavilion, which has glass blowing exhibitions most days. Admission is free.

For those interested in fresh air and natural scenery, consider a visit to the walking trails at the **Black Swamp Preserve** (1014 S. Maple Street, Bowling Green), and the **Toledo Botanical Garden Metropark** (5403 Elmer Dr. Toledo), which features walking paths and beautiful gardens. Admission to both sites is free.
